

Those of you who were in assembly last week, or those of you who are really good at picking up on what's been going on with builders and visitors on site, will have learned that we are in the early stages of replacing some of our school buildings. Kent County Council and the Department for Education have agreed, following their building surveys, that the mobile classroom and the hall block are now at the end of life and need replacing - the staff have thought this for some time as they have battled with leaky roofs and walls and sloping floors and all manner of problems in between!

We have been appointed a project manager and a building company who will oversee and conduct the work which will take place over the next year. During the whole period of the new build, the school will remain open to children and we will be managing the build around our usual daily teaching routines.

The new building will be sited where the mobile classroom and hall currently are and will consist of modular buildings with a brick base. The buildings, although modular, have a long life expectancy and will be double glazed, include air conditioning and be of a larger footprint than we currently have, giving us a more comfortable working environment and more hall and classroom space. Plans include measures to make the school more environmentally friendly, they include an air source heat pump installation and solar panels. In addition to the improvements to the teaching buildings, we will lose the air raid shelter and re-site the cabin building.

The new buildings will not comprise additional classrooms and there is no intention to increase the size of the school by increasing pupil numbers, rather to improve on what we currently have and to ensure sustainability of our small, rural school.

At the current time, the school is working with a number of agencies to enable site surveys that will inform the planning application. Once planning is approved the build will commence properly and I will keep you informed at each stage of the process.

SEESAW

One of the real successes that we have introduced to the school is the Seesaw app. This app allows us to send you messages, photos and videos relating to your child and their learning in school and vice versa from home. It is fabulous to see a child's reaction to your comments and messages when they come through to school or their reaction when we look in class at the home learning they have engaged with.

Unlike most schools, we keep Seesaw going through the whole of the primary phase. Many schools use a communication app in Year R to bridge what happens between nursery settings and schools. I always get great feedback from parents about Seesaw across the years and know that you value it.

Seesaw gives you access to a messaging facility 24 hours a day and this is useful. As a working mum, I know that sometimes I was unable to send a message to my children's school until after I had put them to be and finished with the household chores for the day. Seesaw allows you to do exactly this. However, there is a downside to this access and that is that the staff can pick up your messages 24 hours a day, and often feel obliged to respond to them outside of school hours.

It is so easy in this day and age of instant and accessible technology for communication to get drawn into checking and responding to work messages outside of work hours but this isn't a good thing. Staff's time with their families and friends is important in order to ensure that they have a good balance between work and life outside of school. It is important to protect this to ensure good well being. For this reason, we have decided that Seesaw will only operate between the hours of 7am and 5pm. This means that although you will continue to be able to message 24 hours a day to fit in with your lifestyle, staff will not be responding unless it is between 7am and 5pm. When you send a message outside of these hours you will get an 'out of hours' message. Please be assured that the message has got through but also be aware that it won't be responded to until 7am at the earliest. I know that you will understand that this is important for our staff.

One other thing to remind you about Seesaw. Although there is facility in Seesaw to message groups of parents, please remember that Seesaw is a <u>school</u> communication app and not a <u>social</u> communication app. If the message you wish to post isn't related directly to school matters and your child's learning, then please use other social media platforms for it. From time to time people post requests, thoughts, ideas and opinions which don't relate to school and we reserve the right to delete messages where this is the case.

WINTER CLOTHING

As we approach December, 'tis the season for lost gloves, hats and scarfs! Please ensure that your child's clothing including these items, is labelled with their name so that we can reunite owner and clothing when we find it.

A reminder that boots are NOT part of our school uniform policy.

Please ensure that your child is wearing sensible, black school shoes.

Finally, could you check that for PE your child has a dark pair of jogging bottoms in their PE bag - not leggings please, these are not suitable for PE lessons, being thinner and offering less facility to trap and warm air between the fabric and the body which helps to keep the children warm on colder days. For indoor lessons eg. gymnastics, they still need shorts, so please ensure they are also in the PE kit.

SCHOOL CLOSURE REMINDER

Just a reminder that school is closed on Monday 27 November for staff training. Our staff are undergoing first aid certification in order that we are able to deal with the minor injuries that children get in the school environment as well as more major instances such as bone breaks, heart attacks or anaphylactic shock - which we hope we never encounter for real. Children return to school on Tuesday 28th November.

DOVER COLLABORATION OF SCHOOLS READING CHALLENGE

After a long break, some of our collaboration schools were able to get together this term to hold a reading challenge to find out our strongest, most expressive readers. The competition started off in classes where children who wanted to take part read a piece of fiction and a piece of poetry to their teachers. From this round, two winners and two runners up were chosen and these children went forward to the final of our intra-school competition.



I am delighted to say that despite nerves and wobbles, our children performed extremely well and I am immensely proud of their effort. They were clear, accurate and lively in their readings and I know that the judges - governors and representatives from the three schools - were very impressed.

Well done to Eden, Eliza and Veronika who won the grand final for their year groups. The did a remarkable job and we are immensely proud of them.
