<u>Literacy</u>

This term we will be writing:

Non-chronological reports focusing on mythical creatures from Ancient Greece. These reports will employ formal language, feature topic sentences and organised paragraphs, showcase intriguing facts, and incorporate gripping warnings to captivate our readers.

We will also be exploring the realm of quest stories, where we'll follow heroes on journeys to vanquish menacing monsters, drawing inspiration from the captivating Ancient Greek myth of The Minotaur.

Mathematics

In mathematics this term we will be learning to:

- Compare and order fractions whose denominators are both the same and different
- Recognise mixed numbers and improper fractions and convert from one form to the other
- Add and subtract fractions with the same/different denominators and related fractions;
- Multiply and divide proper fractions and mixed numbers by whole numbers, supported by materials and diagrams.

Reading

Children in Year 5 & 6 are expected to read daily for a minimum of 20 minutes. Every day children should be bringing home their school reading book. There is masses of evidence and research in education to show the positive impact of daily reading on children's wider learning and particularly their language and writing development. Please encourage your child by reading to them and with them as much as possible at home.

Our objectives include:
